Every visit has been an enriching experience, listening to you, praying with you and sharing Jesus in the Holy Communion. I am so grateful that many volunteers are joining me in this wonderful ministry of becoming a neighbor to one another.

The aim of our ministry is to bring spiritual support, comfort, and guidance to individuals and families in their homes. This ministry serves as a direct extension of the church's mission, ensuring that this pastoral care reaches every one of you, especially those who may not be able to attend regular church services. I am developing a regular schedule for home visits, prioritizing those who are homebound, ill, or in need of immediate support. Another area I am focusing on is to assist families in planning and conducting funerals, providing comfort and guidance during their time of loss and thereafter, if need be.

We would also like to know if there is any other way you can think of that I would be able to help you or your family. You are a very important member of our Mother of Perpetual Help family. Please reach out to me or the office if you would like a visit from our team. Another way is to make a note in your monthly contribution slip that you would like a visit from me.

Our Charism as Sisters of St. Joseph of Tarbes is "Building communion". Embracing this charism and living it daily as Religious sisters in this parish is through our ministry of prayer. All the sisters come together at the end of the day with your prayers and take it to the Lord during our evening prayer.
